## Generation Scotland: Scottish Family Health Study and 21CGH to share GS Brand and Governance Structure

21CGH will now share the Generation Scotland brand with the Scottish Family Health Study. Professors David Porteous and Andrew Morris first presented Generation Scotland: Genetic Health in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century (GS: 21CGH) and Generation Scotland: Scottish Family Health Study (GS: SFHS) at the "Health of the Nations" as part of Tartan Day, in Boston on 6th April, on behalf of the Scottish Executive and Scottish Development International.

In the last issue we reported on the successful Scottish Family Health Study (SFHS) proposal submitted to the CSO in response to the Scottish Executive's Genetics and Healthcare Initiative (GHI). At the first SFHS Scientific Committee Meeting it was agreed that the public perception of large genetics projects was important and that

the use of Generation Scotland brand was worth consideration.

Following wide consultation it has been agreed that it is highly beneficial to share the GS brand as there are substantial synergies in research governance and public relations between 21CGH and SFHS, demonstrated by their co-presentation in Boston.

During their visit to Boston, Professor Porteous and Professor Morris were interviewed by US Talk Radio host Dr David Lemberg.
