






MSc Language Education Degree

Programme aims

- The MSc TESOL at Edinburgh is designed to **explore the theory and practice** that will equip you with **cutting edge teaching skills** to teach English to speakers of other languages.
- It will lead you into an exploration of evidence-based research at the frontiers of language learning, methodology and curriculum design.
- It will investigate learning centred 'learnscapes', enabling you not only to practise but to contribute to knowledge in these areas.
- You will learn to design, implement and evaluate substantial research or development tasks, and adapt your planning and teaching approaches to the 21st century demands of rapidly changing teaching and learning contexts and circumstances.
- You will graduate with expanded minds and hearts; with professional knowledge, understanding and enhanced confidence in your ability to teach the English language in and across widely differing curricula and contexts.

The MSc TESOL dissertation

- Under expert supervision, you will complete a 12,000 word dissertation on a research topic of your choice.
- Your dissertation will represent the report of a small-scale piece of research conducted and designed by you.
- You will be matched to a supervisor and accompanied at each stage of this exciting research journey.

Dissertation (60 credits)

MSc TESOL = 180 credits

Total: Semester 1: 3 x 20 credits (core) + 10 credits (RM1)

Semester 2: 2 x 20 credits (options) + 10 credits (RM2)

Dissertation: 60 credits

= 70 credits

= 50 credits

= 60 credits

PROGRAMME OVERVIEW



an interdisciplinary degree programme that aims to provide a pedagogically grounded and practical understanding of issues surrounding the study of language and intercultural communication.

based on the premise that, to help learners develop into multi-lingually and multi-culturally aware world citizens, language teachers must work for maximum integration between language and culture teaching.

designed for both pre-service and in-service language teachers as well as for individuals working in intercultural language education policy, as well as graduates interested in undertaking further postgraduate research at PhD level.

introduce specialised theories, concepts and principles that see intercultural communication as a form of social practice embedded in potentially shifting global processes.

contribute to the creation of autonomous and reflectively thinking practitioners, who are able to deploy their teaching skills in rapidly changing contexts of intercultural language teaching provision.





PROGRAMME OVERVIEW – COURSE BREAKDOWN

Semester 1

You must complete four core courses in Semester 1 (September - December):

- Language and Intercultural Communication Pedagogy (20 credits)
- Language Education for Intercultural Citizenship (20 credits)
- Critical Topics in Intercultural Communication Studies (20 credits)
- Sources of Knowledge: Understanding and analysing research literature (10 credits)

Semester 2

You must complete one core course and two option courses in Semester 2 (January - April).

Core course:

 Conceptualising Research: Foundations, Assumptions and Praxis (10 credits)

Each option course is worth 20 credits. One of the options must be from a list of SCQF Level 11 courses.




