










University of Edinburgh Special Collections






Talbot Rice Gallery






In-Person Classes with (Amazing) Online Learning Resources

Our online provision hosts sites for each course you are enrolled on. These sites contain learning materials such as reading lists, presentations, lecture recordings (in some cases) and other class-related information. You submit your assessment and essays online.

The online provision also contains useful information on student support initiatives and University regulations. Our online resources enable further contact with lecturers and student support staff. The specialist art libraries and the Institute for Academic Development offer special postgraduate courses also online to assist students with essay writing and doing their best.







MSc MoCA overview

- Two compulsory courses that focus on research in the field, one in each semester: Research Theories & Methods (Semester 1) & The Cultures and Politics of Display (Semester 2)
- Many theme-focused electives/option courses
- 15,000-word Dissertation
- Optional Work Placements in a range of cultural contexts
- Contact time with the annually appointed Fellow in Contemporary Art Theory and Curating (as part of the Semester 2 compulsory course)
- Excellent resources and research context, including extracurricular Research Seminars and Research Cluster events
- Academic staff: leading researchers shaping the field internationally, many with experience in curating
- Taught courses conclude at the end of March/early April. In the remaining months, students research and write the Dissertation.
- No exams! Course assessment is based on essay writing.
- A popular Masters, currently having between forty and fifty students (receiving hundreds of applications annually).

Work Placements

Our <u>optional</u> work placements are a popular feature of our programme. These are limited and offered <u>on a competitive basis</u>, as availability in the sector vary annually. The primary aim is to introduce students to a working environment related to art and/or art history, or culture more broadly. Placements are arranged in appropriate host institutions in, or near, Edinburgh.

Students are offered appropriate, academically related tasks, such as cataloguing, indexing, helping to prepare and install an exhibition, drawing up a publicity or education leaflet, or researching conservation case histories. Upon completion of the placement, students write and present a Report or other assignment as appropriate. Preparations and guidance begin in Semester 1 while the Placement is carried out in Semester 2.





Dissertations

15,000 words, based on a proposal submitted by you, the student. The proposal/topic *must* relate to the Masters content. The dissertation will be the most exciting part of your programme of study, where you will take control of your research and we will help you achieve your goal. You progress to the supervised dissertation *after* you have completed the taught part of the course (the compulsory and option courses).

That our staff have expertise in a range of subjects means you can research an extremely broad range of topics. The dissertation helps many students understand whether they wish to carry on to doctoral research, but it also offers a specialism to those who want to opt for a career straight after the Masters.

What do our students go on to do?

Ruth Bretherick did the MSc in 2011 and went on to do a PhD. She is presently Research and Public Engagement Curator at Fruitmarket Gallery, Edinburgh.

Mekhala Dave, from India, was a lawyer. She did the MSc in 2028 and was able to offer support and pro-bono legal advice to artists and art organisations based in Edinburgh and Glasgow throughout her studies and since graduating has been able to continue both her work as a lawyer and her studies through a PhD.

Diego Chocano did the MSc in 2018 and has since been working as a curator in the UK. In 2024, he was Assistant Curator of *Unravel: The Power and Politics of Textiles in Art* at the Barbican, London.

Tobey Pan, from China, was a linguist. She did the MSc in 2019, worked in the art sector, published an article based on her dissertation, and then returned to Edinburgh as a PhD researcher, securing the prestigious SGSAH scholarship.

Olympia Contopidis, from Germany, did the MSc in 2020. She has since held various curatorial posts, published articles (the first based on her MSc dissertation), presently being Gallery Manager at Galerie Barbara, Vienna.

Aisling Clark, from Ireland, did the MSc in 2022, was awarded a prize for her dissertation, and was then offered the Provost's Fellow in Curating 2023 at The Douglas Hyde Gallery, Trinity College Dublin.

Investing in our facilities

Edinburgh College of Art (ECA) is excited to be undertaking a capital redevelopment of ECA's Lauriston Campus over the next 3 years, from April 2024 – April 2027.






