Embarking on a research project

- A period of research time committed to working through a single idea over several months/years is extremely special
- In the arts, this is usually researcher-led, rather than around a set of specific research questions set by the laboratory hosting the PhD.
- You are the originator of the idea and the main energy behind making the work lead to results.
- The University, your supervisors, peer group and wider network offer the context, support, and framework for the project





The kinds of projects we can support in Music

- Composition for instruments, voices, songs and albums.
- Experimental work for ensembles and live electronics
- Opera or Musical Theatre
- Film and audio-visual composition
- Game audio and related fields such as VR/AR, Ambisonics,
- AI and music composition/sonic art/sound design

- Community and participatory arts
- Music psychology and the musical brain

Preparing a proposal

- A proposal should be simple, clear and to the point
- It should aim to show you have the skills needed to *do* the research, this means including a link to your online portfolio which demonstrates your background as a composer/sonic artist/inventor/performer
- The proposal will in essence contain five main elements;







Preparing a proposal

- Why -- an exciting reason for why this work is important, meaningful, needed now (some introductory context). What are the key ideas behind this project?
- Methods how do you think you will work? What's the plan? What kinds of tools, concepts, ideas etc. will you need to develop? How will these evolve over the period of research?
- Outputs what will these ideas and methods lead to? New music, sonic art, sound technologies, written papers and reasoning, case studies etc?
- References As you write you'll necessarily produce references to other writers and artists. You might refer to books and papers, pieces and project. You may not necessarily have read, heard and seen them all through, but linking to these will demonstrate your awareness of the wider literature and research in your area, showing that you know of the context for the work you want to produce.
- Links to your portfolio and artist bio The most representative examples of the kind of artist you are and that may show the kind of work you might be capable of.



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Writing your proposal... a suggestion

- START WITH YOUR OUTPUTS and work backwards
- You're an artist so what do you want to make during the period?
- How will you make this work? What do you need, when do you need it?
- Why is this work important to you and why will it be of value to the creative world you identify with?
- This should get you to the exciting reason and purpose of the project that should hook the reader in immediately.







Finding a supervisor






