### Why Edinburgh?

- The School of History, Classics & Archaeology is part of the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Science
- Based in the Old Medical School in the Historic Old Town of Central Edinburgh
- The University is ranked in the world top 30 (QS World University Rankings 2024)
- School community of approximately 475 graduate students and 150 academic staff





### Why Edinburgh?

- History at Edinburgh ranked 22nd among all history departments in the world (QS World University Rankings 2024)
- One of the largest departments of History in the UK
- A long tradition of teaching History Edinburgh was one of the first places that taught History as a separate subject. Some of the world's great minds have studied and taught here











### Taught MSc(s) in History (full-time)

Semester one

- 60 credits
- Two specialized option courses (20 credits each)
- One of two core skills-training courses (20 credits)

Semester two

- 60 credits
- Two specialized option courses (20 credits each)
- One of two core skills-training courses (20 credits)

Summer

- 60 credits
- 12-15,000 word dissertation, based on primary source materials (60 credits)





### Taught MSc(s) in History (part-time)

Year one

• Usually 60 credits, some students do more (e.g. 40 + 40)

Year two

• 60 credits, some students do less

Summer of year two

- 60 credits
- 12-15,000 word dissertation, based on primary source materials (60 credits)

### Teaching

- On-campus courses weekly seminars
- Online courses synchronous (live) seminars organized through the Learn Virtual Learning Environment (VLE). Plus discussion boards, group exercises, research diaries and blog entries



#### Assessment

- 4,000-5,000 words per 20 credit course
- Usually a longer essay plus one or more shorter pieces of work
- Non-assessed exercises will be used to 'feed-forward' into formally assessed course work
- The Dissertation is a 12,000-15,000 word piece of work, based on primary source material, supervised by one or more members of staff, over the summer period





#### Dissertation

- c. 60 full time members of staff with global research interests
- Recent dissertation topics include:
  - The Church of Scotland in the Highlands: Presbyterian Approaches to the 'Increase of Popery' in the Early Eighteenth Century
  - Italian Immigration to the United States of America: A Focused History of the Italian-American Community and Culture
  - 'Mad, Bad or Dangerous': The perception of shell-shock in the British medical community 1914 - 1920
  - Detention or Shelter? The Sangatte and Oakington refugee camps, 1999 2010
  - Was the Irish Language an Important Aspect to the Identity of the Irish Diaspora in North America and Britain, 1850-1900?





### Applying for study

### Eligibility

- UK 2:1 honours degree, a minimum US 3.25 GPA or international equivalent, in a subject related to your programme
- Cases can also be made for non-standard entry, email
  - HCA-PGT@ed.ac.uk





### **English language**

- IELTS: total 7.0 (at least 6.0 in each module)
- TOEFL-iBT: total 100 (at least 20 in each module)
- PTE(A): total 70 (at least 59 in each of component)
- CAE and CPE: total 185 (at least 169 in each module)
- Trinity ISE: ISE III with a pass in all four components

- Due to high demand, this programme operates a gathered field approach to admissions, with two application deadlines as noted below.
- Each application round has a decision deadline, also listed below, but note that we may make offers to the strongest candidates on an ongoing basis, in advance of the published decision deadline.
