Athens of the North


 One of the largest groups of Classics-focused academics in the UK, covering a variety of research interests

 Classical languages have been taught and studied at the University since its foundation in 1583









Taught MSc(s) in Classics (full-time)

Core course

• Skills and Methods in Classics (20 credits)

Option courses

- Select five option courses from a wide range
- 20 credits each

Dissertation

- 15,000 word research project
- Based on primary source materials
- 60 credits





Taught MSc(s) in Classics (part-time)

Year one

• Usually 60 credits, some students do more (e.g. 40 + 40)

Year two

• 60 credits, some students do less

Summer of year two

- 60 credits
- 12-15,000 word dissertation, based on primary source materials (60 credits)





Option courses

Courses change from year to year.

- The Hittites (Archaeology)
- The Jewish Diaspora under the Roman Empire (ancient history)
- Sparta and Crete (ancient history)
- The Hellenistic City (ancient history)
- Epicurus and Epicureanism (ancient philosophy)





Late Antique, Islamic and Byzantine Studies (LAIBS)

- Core course:
 - Approaches to the Long Late Antiquity (20 credits)
- Language courses:
 - Latin, Greek and Arabic (choose two, 20 credits each)
- Option courses (choose three, 20 credits each). Sample list:
 - Creeds, Councils and Controversies: Patristic and Medieval
 - Mosques, Palaces and Gardens in the Golden Age of Islam
 - Art and Cultural Exchange in Mughal India 1500-1900
 - Around 900: The Early Islamic West in a Global Context
 - Mystical Islam
 - Greek Palaeography
 - Byzantine Archaeology: The archaeology of the Byzantine empire and its neighbours AD 500-850.

- Dissertation (60 credits). Past titles include:
 - Isauria from 350–410
 - Polemic in the Work of St Romanos the Melodist
 - Episcopal Authority in Northern Gaul during the Firth to Eighth Centuries
 - The Sources of Shi'ism





Teaching

- On-campus courses normally have weekly seminars
- Most teaching is in small groups of less than twenty students
- Teaching staff regularly hold office hours and are available to meet with students about their work
- Reading lists and PowerPoints are uploaded to Learn (our course management system), and we support all of our learners





Assessment

- 4,000-5,000 words per 20 credit course
- Usually a longer essay with some courses requiring an additional shorter piece(s) of work
- Non-assessed exercises will be used to 'feed-forward' into formally assessed course work
- The Dissertation is a 15,000 word piece of work, based on primary source material, supervised by one or more members of staff over the summer period





Dissertation

- Recent Classical dissertation topics include
 - Dynastic Strife and Intrigue: The Roles of Mothers, Wives and Sisters at the Court of Herod the Great.
 - Speeches and Military Leadership in Xenophon's Anabasis and Cyropaedia
 - Tadmor: A Case of Heritage Destruction and Reconstruction
 - Uncovering obscuritas in Persius' Satires







Applying for study

- Evidence of proficiency in English language, where appropriate

Eligibility

- UK 2:1 honours degree, a minimum US 3.25 GPA or international equivalent, in a subject related to your programme
- Cases can also be made for non-standard entry, email
 - HCA-PGT@ed.ac.uk







English language

- IELTS: total 7.0 (at least 6.0 in each module)
- TOEFL-iBT: total 100 (at least 20 in each module)
- PTE(A): total 70 (at least 59 in each of component)
- CAE and CPE: total 185 (at least 169 in each module)
- Trinity ISE: ISE III with a pass in all four components
