

Introduction to the School


- Part of the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Science

- Postgraduate research community of approximately 150 students, who work with 150 academic staff
















Why Edinburgh? – Primary source databases




Our research programmes

PhD by Distance now an option







Assessment

MSc (by Research)

- 1 year FT programme (2 year PT for UK)
- Work with supervisory team
- Audit core course/s
- can attend other courses with the agreement of the convener
- 30,000 word dissertation

PhD

- A programme to train you as a researcher
- 3 years full-time / 6 years part-time
- End result: a book length thesis (80,000-100,000 words) which makes an original contribution to knowledge
- Opportunities to engage in conference presentations, conference organisation, creating academic networks, internships, teaching





PhD by Distance

Following differences from the on-campus programme:

- FT or PT options for international students
- No requirement to be in Edinburgh
- Intended for students who have experience of OL studies; have good academic reasons to be based somewhere other than Edinburgh (e.g. access to source materials); have suitable library and IT resources to hand; and who do not require training or wish to take up opportunities (e.g. tutoring) that are only available in Edinburgh
- Same fees as on-campus programmes





PhD review process

- All PhD students have an annual review
- Normally a presentation of thesis topic/progress to a panel including the supervisory team and independent members.
- Student are expected to have circulated documents to the panel in advance.
 (Typically thesis outline, a timeline, a piece of writing).
- Panel decides if enough progress has been made to proceed to the next year.





PhD training opportunities

- Various training courses:
 - Research ethics, language training, PhD skills sessions
- Writing workshops
- Institute for Academic Development (IAD)
 - training programmes and professional development (<u>www.ed.ac.uk/institute-academic-development</u>)
- You may also 'audit' some MA or MSc courses relevant to your research





PhD tutoring/demonstrating

- PhD students may get an opportunity to tutor first- or second-year undergraduates or demonstrate in practical sessions to undergraduates and taught MSc students
- Tutoring/demonstrating normally occurs in 2nd and 3rd years
- You will be paid for this work
- This option is only available to students on the on-campus programmes

Applying for study

- Applicants must contact potential supervisors in the first instance and name them when they apply (mode of study should be discussed with them too)
- Online application form and an additional form for PhD by Distance applicants
- Transcripts/degree certificates
- Evidence of proficiency in English language, where appropriate
- Two references
- Research proposal
- Interview process following initial application
- 5 step application process: hca.ed.ac.uk/prospective-postgraduates/how-to-apply





Eligibility

- UK 2:1 honours degree, a minimum US 3.25 GPA or international equivalent, in a subject related to your programme
- PhD requires a relevant masters degree with an overall mark of at least 65%, or the international equivalent
- Cases can also be made for non-standard entry, email <u>hca-pgr@ed.ac.uk</u>






