
Comparative Public Policy MSc




Comparative Public Policy at a glance



Examples from past dissertation projects

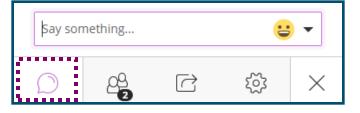
- Examining the political feasibility of a Universal Basic Income in the UK

- Comparing family policy expansion in Germany and Japan.

- 'Placement based' dissertation
 - A project determined by external organisation
 - Application based and competitive process.




