Why study for an MSc in Conflict, Security and Development?

<u>What type of issues are you interested</u> <u>in?</u>

- The intersection of conflict with key development issues such as poverty, governance and democracy
- The relationships between local security needs and grand politics
- The relationships between multi-level actors of security
- The systems that govern all these

MSc CSD Programme Requirements, 2024-25

1. Three required courses:

Conflict, Security and Development Politics and Theories of International Development Peace and Conflict in Africa

2. Three optional courses: Wide selection (see sample on next slide)

3. Standard Dissertation or Policy-Focused Dissertation (Apr-Aug)

CSD Standard Dissertation

- Extended piece of independent, in-depth scholarship on a topic selected by the student related to programme content
- Student's own endeavour, but with individual supervisor;
- up to 15,000 words
- Opportunity to choose area/topic of interest
- Excellent preparation for further academic, teaching, or policy work careers
- Preparatory intensive workshop held in spring





CSD Policy-Focused Dissertation

- Extended piece of independent, in-depth scholarship on a topic with a policy focus
- Student's own endeavour, but with individual supervisor and advice from members of policy and practitioner community
- up to 15,000 words (13,500 main text and 1,500 policy briefing)
- Opportunity to choose area/topic of interest
- Aimed at those with interest in careers in policy and practitioner fields, provides experience pitching ideas to policy community and writing for policy audience
- Opportunity to build networks within professional fields of conflict, security and development and share dissertation findings with relevant policy audiences
- Preparatory intensive workshop held in spring







How will you study?

Exploratory, critical and analytical

 The programme will introduce you to a range of analytical perspectives, and train you to adopt a critical, analytical and engaging approach to the study of conflict

Emphasis on independent work

 You will be expected to engage in independent reading, thought and writing, though you will be guided by lectures, seminar discussion, group work and supervised projects.





How will we teach you?

- Lectures/ Seminars
- Training workshops on methods, policy analysis, including access to security practitioners
- Self-led and Group Study
- Independent Research




