Climate Change 2022: Impacts, Adaptation and Vulnerability

The Working Group II contribution to the Soth Assessment Report assesses the impacts of climate change, looking at ecosystems, biodiversity, and human communities at global and regional levels. It also reviews vulnerabilities and the capacities and limits of the natural world and human societies to adapt to climate change









What is the MSc GEPS about? (in words)

- <u>Approach</u>: It offers a social-science based, multi/inter/trans-disciplinary understanding of the key concepts, actors and dynamics characterising global environmental problems and solutions;
- <u>Tools/skills</u>: It harnesses our University's expertise to analyse political, ethical and societal dimensions of environmental problems and possible solutions;
- <u>Content</u>: It addresses global environmental issues such as climate change, biodiversity, energy and sustainable development





MSc GEPS Programme Requirements, 2024-25 (180 credits in all)

1. Global Environment: Key Issues (Sem 1)

2. At least one of following:

- Global Environmental Politics
- Global Environment & Society
- Climate Change Justice and Responsibility
- Environmental Risk: Politics, Communication, Ethics

3. Four optional courses (80 credits) – wide selection

4. Dissertation or Placement-Based Dissertation (Apr-Aug) (60 credits)

Studying & Learning





How will you study?

Exploratory and analytical

 The programme will introduce you to a range of analytical perspectives (political, legal, ethical and societal) from which to examine global environmental issues

Emphasis on independent work

 You will be expected to engage in independent reading, thought and writing, though you will be guided by lectures, seminar discussion, group work and supervised projects.





Teaching Formats

- Lectures / Seminars typically capped at around 30 students at the MSc level
- Self-led / Group Study
- Independent Research (including dissertation)







GEPS Research Dissertation

- Extended piece of independent, in-depth scholarship on an environmental politics, ethics or sociology topic;
- Student's own endeavour, but with individual supervisor;
- up to 15,000 words (*possible change to 10,000 words for 2025-2626)
- Opportunity to choose area/topic of interest;
- Excellent preparation for further academic, teaching, or policy work; can be 'desk-based' or involve field work.
- Workshops held in winter; retreat towards end of Semester 2





Placement-based dissertation

- Project-based report with organisation (NGO, charity, govt body, social enterprise);
- Project selected in consultation with the host organisation and Programme Director
- 12-15,000 words (including project diary)
- 2024-2025
 - Information sessions in October
 - Both on-line and some in person
 - List of pre-arranged placement places released in December
 - Places are competitive (no guarantee)
 - Student led placements also possible


