Social Policy subject area


- We conduct independent, high-quality, multi- and inter- disciplinary research on various social and public policy areas, including



Micro-methods courses - RTC

Dissertation

A single 15,000 word piece of independent and in-depth research.

- Or a 'Placement based dissertation' of 12,000 words plus 3000 word diary. PBD topics/ orgs vary by year and this option is competitive process with application and eligibility conditions
- The dissertation is written in the summer months (April to August) after the taught courses are successfully completed.
- An academic dissertation supervisor will provide you with support and guidance while you research and write your dissertation.


