MERG hosts interdisciplinary research activities undertaken by academic staff and postgraduates from across the College of Humanities and Social Science with a research interest and expertise on the modern and contemporary politics of the Middle East. Our members' work has been internationally recognised, as illustrated by: the various research grants we obtained, such as the Marie Skłodowska-Curie and the Leverhulme fellowships; our editorial affiliations with University of Edinburgh Press and journals like Constellations: An International Journal of Critical and Democratic Theory; our involvement as consultants with international organisations such as UNESCO, UN Women, International Centre for Transitional Justice, and the World Bank and with professional associations such as the British Society for Middle Eastern Studies Council. Our publications have also received prizes and award nominations. Members of the group were also active in the establishment of the Middle East Network in Scotland, which brings together scholars of the region who are based in Scottish universities
