Edinburgh College of Art (ECA) is excited to be undertaking a capital redevelopment of ECA's Lauriston Campus over the next 3 years, from April 2024 – April 2027.

The project aims to maximise the use of existing space, improve accessibility, and create a vibrant campus that fosters collaboration and innovation.

The project involves refurbishing and repurposing various spaces across the Lauriston campus, including technical facilities, student and teaching spaces, and the relocation of the Reid School of Music from Alison House to the Lauriston Campus. Within the broader University this includes supervisions with Divinity, Education, BioSciences, Social and Political studies, Anthropology, Archaeology, Health etc



Culminates with position paper, research poster and student-led public symposium






PGR training at IAD / UoE







Applying for MPhil or PhD...





What is required?

- Research proposal
- Writing sample
- Portfolio (if by practice) max 10-page pdf / links / check size for upload / consider relevance to proposal
- Potential supervisors
- Usual references / ELT etc

once you have submitted your application and have been sent your MyEd EASE login you will be able to upload your portfolio.





What are we looking for?

- Good fit supervision, specialisms, research environment
- Strong proposal (original & feasible)
- Awareness of the **field** of research (developments)
- Mature practice (to withstand years of scrutiny)
- Ability to think and write critically (evidence)
- Personal statement (relevant experience)
- *Practice has to ask questions of the theory & vice versa*
 Word count: 1,000-3,000 words
 Bibliography not included in word count





- (a) AIMS: Identify a clear gap in existing knowledge. Succinctly and clearly explain your aims and objectives. Provide a title, identify a particular research question or area of concern prompting this research and convey its significance. For Art and Design programmes, please state if you are applying for a Theory Based or Practice Based PhD.
- (b) CONTEXT: Demonstrate excellent knowledge of the field and preparedness to undertake the proposed research project. Convey the intellectual, academic, artistic context of the research question(s) or concerns. Provide a bibliography of relevant scholarly literature and other key research resources.





- (c) METHODS: Your proposal must be original and innovative, substantively and/or methodologically. Explain the research processes and methods that you will apply. Indicate why they are the most appropriate and, if relevant, most innovative methods.
- (d) IMPACT: The potential impact of the research must be explicit, with realistic and appropriate plans for maximising the impact identified (e.g. engaging possible non-academic partnerships.) Explain how your research will have academic and artistic impact and/or social and economic impact.





(e) CLARITY: Writing and presentation must be of the highest standard. Ensure that your proposal is succinct, clearly written and free of jargon (it should be readily understood by a non-expert).


PGR Funding

Students can be funded by:

- SGSAH (AHRC PhD Doctoral Studentship)
 (tuition + stipend for 3.5 years)
- ECA PhD Scholarship (tuition + stipend for 3years)
- College Research Award (tuition + stipend for 3years)
- Edinburgh Doctoral College Scholarship
 (tuition + stipend for 3.5 years)

Open to: full time / part time / UK / overseas / on campus / by distance students

PGR timeline

- Students start in September or January
- Research Methods training Sept December (12wks)
- After 9 months students begin the annual review process producing an annual report & text for an independent reviewer. The discussion around this is used to evaluate whether the student's research is on track. It provides a map for the following year for the student and supervisory team.
- This process repeats every year & is also a chance to check the supervisory team is still appropriate for the research and if there are any issues or adjustments to be made, or training required.
- Students are encouraged to take breaks from their studies
- Students may audit courses throughout their studies

Supervision

- Each supervision team / specialism / time commitment is bespoke to the student's research
- We expect that students will see their primary supervisor approx. once a month
- We encourage whole supervision team meetings to happen at least once a semester
- As a team they may discuss and decide to 'front load' supervision in blocks to allow for specific practice processes / field trips etc.






For staff... supervision is

A critical, reflective process helping students to:

- frame their research enquiry
- support their 'not-knowing'
- challenge their assumptions
- direct them to relevant sources / texts / events / works
- learn from cohort and from the supervision team, reviewers & staff
- ...we are all co-producers of knowledge



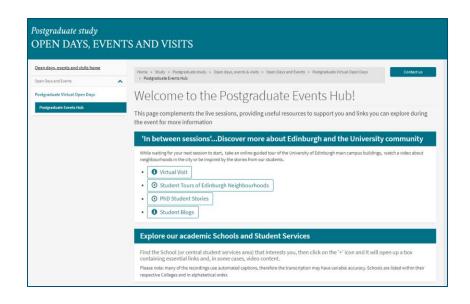
