PhD Application deadlines & requirements

PhD application deadlines:

For January entry the deadline is 1st November and for September entry it is 1st July.

Prescribed period of study for PhD:

This differs for full-time or part-time mode of study. PhD full-time 3 years, PhD part-time 6 years.

Research proposal and writing sample are essential!

Research Proposal Guidance

A research proposal identifying the objectives and scope of the research and stages necessary for successful completion is a necessary and important part of your application.

Your research proposal is the key that allows staff to understand your intentions and readiness for a research degree. The best research proposals are developed through several drafts and demonstrate the **originality** of your proposed project.

The proposal may well later evolve and even change radically through the research process, but the initial proposal is required to help identify the particular research question(s) or areas of concern prompting this research and for staff to help identify suitable supervisory teams.

The research proposal must be uploaded with your online application. Applications cannot be fully considered until an adequate research proposal has been received.

Suggested word count – 2,000 to 3,000 words.



We will assess your proposal against the following criteria:

- (a) AIMS: Identify a clear gap in existing knowledge. Succinctly and clearly explain your aims and objectives. Provide a title, identify a particular research question or area of concern prompting this research and convey its significance.
- (b) CONTEXT: Demonstrate excellent knowledge of the field and preparedness to undertake the proposed research project. Convey the intellectual, academic, artistic context of the research question(s) or concerns. Provide a bibliography of relevant scholarly literature and other key research resources.
- (c) METHODS: Your proposal must be original and innovative, substantively and/or methodologically. Explain the research processes and methods that you will apply. Indicate why they are the most appropriate and, if relevant, most innovative methods.
- (d) IMPACT: Explain how your research will have academic impact and/or social and economic impact.
- (e) CLARITY: Writing and presentation must be of the highest standard. Ensure that your proposal is succinct, clearly written and free of jargon (it should be readily understood by a non-expert).

Ensure that you do not write more than the specified word limit. Context, methods and sources must be well thought out and clearly expressed in your Research Proposal.

How to avoid common mistakes

- Submit all required material
- Hone your research proposal and select an appropriate writing sample
- Applications should be made as early as possible. The deadlines are the last possible point of application, but this does not always allow enough time for the academic panel to review the application. If an applicant needs a visa for study then this is particularly important as they cannot apply for a visa until they receive an unconditional offer.
