The LLM in Innovation, Technology and the Law

Explores how the law responds to, regulates, and promotes new and emerging technologies.

- Analyse new technologies, examining their legally sensitive areas.
- Evaluate innovations and assess their nature and impact in relation to the law.
- Study different modes of regulation: the law, the markets and the technology itself.
- Examine the potential of technology to support legal and judicial processes.







LLM degree structure

Basic requirements - completion of 180 credits

120 credits in taught courses

Contingent on successful completion of taught element

60 credits in through a dissertation



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Studying online

- Two 10-week semesters
- Asynchronous study
- Class sizes typically 15 to 25 students.
- Participation in weekly online discussions and activities (over 10 weeks). Interaction with tutors and classmates.
- Set reading (e.g. textbook chapter, articles, case law).
- Assessment typically:
 - 60% essay (4,000 words)
 - 40% shorter written exercise (1,000 words)
- Please note assessments will vary from course to course.

- Comparative and International Corporate Governance (20 credits)

Dissertation

- Process starts in February of your final year of study
- Online dissertation fair lasting 2 weeks in March
- Topic proposals
- Allocation of topic and supervisor
- Pay attention to the limitations that apply to the LLM when choosing your topics
- 3-month supervision process including 3 scheduled meetings with your supervisor
- August submission deadline

Worth 60 credits - 10,000 words maximum
