Workload 2

- Semester 1: 10 weeks from mid-September, final essay due around 2 weeks after the end of semester
- Semester 2: 10 weeks from mid-January, final essay due around 2 weeks after the end of semester
- MSc dissertation due mid-August of your last year







Dissertation

- You will start to think about the dissertation over the summer the year before the last
- In February/March of the last year you will be allocated a supervisor
- You will work towards the dissertation with your supervisor until mid August
- Option to do standard research dissertation (15,000 words) or placementbased placement (12,000 words + 3,000 words reflective journal)





Course structure

- Course assessment:
 - Participation in online forum (20%)
 - Portfolio of online activities (20%)
 - End-of-course essays (60%)
- Detailed feedback on essays and posts
- Access to online academic support
