• The School of Divinity is ranked 5th in the UK and 8th in the world for theology, divinity and religious studies and Philosophy is ranked 6th in the UK and 22nd in the world. (QS World University Rankings by Subject 2025)

• Offers a broad range of study options, allowing students to tailor studies around their interests.

Large & interdisciplinary

Both the Philosophy department and School of Divinity at Edinburgh are among the largest of their kind in the UK, each consisting of ca. 40 full-time academic staff across a wide range of specialisms. Philosophy staff work in epistemology, ethics, logic and language, mind and cognition, religion and science, non-western philosophy, and the history of philosophy. In Divinity, staff work on Christianity, Islam, Judaism, Buddhism and Hinduism, Indigenous religions in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, new religious movements or spiritualities, and atheism and non-religion.





MSc Philosophy, Science & Religion (PSR)

- An interdisciplinary postgraduate programme jointly taught by the School of Divinity and the Department of Philosophy.
- We bring together world leaders in the fields of philosophy, science and theology to provide you with a thorough grounding in the relationship between science and religion.

Options

• The programme offers three options depending your needs:

- The MSc either full-time (one year) or part time (between two and four years). This is 180 credits.
- The Diploma either full-time (9 months) or part time (between two and four years). This is 120 credits.
- The Postgraduate Certificate part time (between one and two years). This is 60 credits.
- Part-time students take a minimum of 20 and a maximum of 60 credits per semester.





Considerations

• How much time do you have to study per week?

- What are your other responsibilities?
- As a rough guide, we expect full-time students to study for approximately <u>35 hours</u> a week and part-time students are likely.

What do you want out of the degree?

- Prepare for further postgraduate work in PSR.
- Change careers.
- Learn more about PSR in a rigorous academic context, but with no plans to pursue professionally.





Courses

There are two core courses:

Philosophy, Science and Religion 1: The Physical World

 Introduces key themes of philosophy, science and religion, with a focus on the physical sciences and their metaphysical implications. Topics include Cosmology, Quantum mechanics, Laws of nature, Naturalism, Earth Sciences & the Anthropocene.

Philosophy, Science and Religion 2: Mind and Life

 Explores the major contemporary issues in the debate between science and religion, and the ways in which philosophy has mediated. Topics include Evolutionary biology, neuroscience, human origins, the problem of evil, miracles, the theologies of creation and providence, free will, and the question of the soul.





Courses

- Optional courses include:
 - Philosophy of Science
 - Philosophy of Religion
 - History of Science and Religion
 - Artificial Intelligence and Theology
 - Islamic Philosophy
 - Islam and Science







• **Optional** courses from other online programmes in Philosophy:

- Ethic and/or Advanced Ethics
- Epistemology and/or Advanced Epistemology
- Philosophy of Mind and Cognitive Science and/or Advanced Philosophy of Mind and Cognitive Science





Programme Dissertation

- Dissertation (8,000 words, 60 credits):
 - Involves conducting independent research on a topic of your choosing (requires approval by programme directors).
 - Three months dissertation only period with online supervision.
 - Flexible dissertation periods for part-time students.





Teaching Delivery

- This is an **online only** programme:
 - Regular feedback from faculty and live interactions.
 - Interact with other students on the programme as part of a dedicated virtual learning environment.
 - Taught through a combination of video lectures, online seminars, discussion boards exercises.





Entry Requirements

- You normally need a 2:1 degree (or international equivalent) in a relevant subject, like science (biology, chemistry, physics, psychology, maths) or humanities (philosophy, theology, religious studies).
- If you don't meet this exactly, you can still apply. We might ask for something extra, like a writing sample.
- If you apply for the MSc but don't fully qualify, we might offer you a place on the PgCert instead. If you do well, you can move up to the MSc.
- If English isn't your first language, you'll need to show proof of your English skills before getting an offer.
