






Career benefits

How does an exchange work?





How does an exchange fit in your degree?

Typical process		
Apply for exchange	2 nd year	
Study abroad	3 rd year	
Return to complete degree	4 th year	

- Students on fiveyear programmes can study abroad in third, fourth or fifth year.
- Students will be taking courses suitable for their degree course to be approved by their school.
- Earn credit towards your degree by successfully completing study abroad



Tuition fees

- Pay no tuition fees to your host institution
- Continue paying your Edinburgh fees while you study away

Eligibility factors

- Your degree programme
- Your progression status you need to pass 240 credits by the end of your second year
- Your language level for study in foreign language
- Direct entry students at the discretion of your School/College
- Availability of relevant courses for your degree subject

Language requirements

Language of instruction

- Some partners institutions do not offer courses taught in English
- You can check the Exchange Destination Guide for detailed information: <u>www.ed.ac.uk/global/study-work-</u> <u>away/study-exchanges/where-can-i-go</u>

Language level

- You need B2 level for the language of instruction at the time you apply
- For French, Spanish, Italian and German, an assessment will be arranged for you in March/April (not applicable to students of European languages)





Things to Consider: Commitment





Things to Consider: Academic considerations

- Research available courses especially if you are on a joint honours programme
 - Specific academic areas
- Term dates
- Language of instruction
- Teaching methods
- Examination methods





Things to Consider: **Costs of your Year Abroad**

- Limited external funding no guarantee of availability
- Ensure you have enough funds in advance
- Cost of living in your chosen destination country/city
- Visa cost (and evidence of personal funds)
- Administration fee in some universities
- Insurance
- Travel to/from your destination
- Accommodation





Things to Consider: Budgeting

- Incoming Money
 - Student loan and bursaries
 - Funding
- Outgoing Costs
 - Accommodation, flights, visa, uni expenses
 - Daily expenses
 - Travel plans
- Local support discounted student housing, housing benefits...

If you are eligible for funding, you will only receive funds once your exchange has started. You'll need to have alternative funds available to pay for core expenses like food and rent.


Things to Consider: Funding

- Turing Scheme (Europe and worldwide) not guaranteed
 - Limited funding available. For the AY 2023/24, this was reserved to Mandatory Students.
 - The University will provide financial support to all the students required to undertake an exchange abroad as a mandatory requirement of their undergraduate degree programme.
 - Students meeting the Turing criteria for widening access will be prioritised.

- SEMP (Swiss-European mobility scheme)
 - Students allocated a place to Switzerland will need to check availability with their host university



Things to Consider: **Practical** considerations

- Is your passport valid?
- Visa requirements for International and European destinations
 - Do you need to provide proof of access to funds?
 - Do you need to pay for medical tests, police tests?
- Accommodation options






Things to Consider: **Personal** considerations

- Can you see yourself studying at the host institution?
- Can you see yourself **living** in the host country?
- Have you considered the differences between the UK and the host country?
- What is the support like at the host institution or in the host country?



Application process





Types of exchange

Subject-Specific

- Open to students from specific School or subject area
- Joint honours students apply through first subject
- Access to specific courses is not guaranteed


University-wide

- Open to the vast majority of Schools and subject areas
- No guaranteed access to specific subject areas or courses
- Mostly international destinations

UoE Internal Application - Questions

- Personal Details
- Study Details
- Language Skills
- Requested host university/universities
- Personal Statement
- Terms & Conditions





UoE Internal Application – Requested host university/universities

How many preferred destinations can you select?

- Subject-specific: a maximum of 5 institutions
- University-wide: a maximum of 5 institutions

You can submit applications for both routes – a maximum of 10 institutions in total





UoE Internal Application - Personal statements and Peer Marking (for university wide applicants)

Writing your statement

- 750 words (limit of 5000 characters, including spaces)
- Give equal weighting to the three criteria:
 - Academic motivation
 - Ambassadorial qualities
 - Personal development
- Upload to PebblePad by Monday20 November, 12:00pm (noon)

Peer-marking statements

- Five statements to peer-mark, Wednesday 22nd November at 12:00pm (noon)
- Consider each of the three criteria:
 - Academic motivation
 - Ambassadorial qualities
 - Personal development
- Deadline of Tuesday 28 November, 12:00pm (noon)

How do I apply?

- Joint honours apply under lead subject
- Apply as early as possible late applications are not accepted

Assessment and Allocations





Application criteria

What is the application assessment criteria?

- Subject-specific: they can vary from school to school, contact your Exchange Coordinator
- University-wide: criteria are stated in the relevant application guide
 - You can find the application guides for both types of exchange online: <u>www.ed.ac.uk/global/study-work-away/study-</u>

University-wide assessment and allocation criteria

University wide applicants are allocated based on the **ranking of your application score**.

Your application score is made up of:

- Your academic record (50%) Average of 1st year grades (provided by your College)
- Your personal statement mark (50%) Moderated peer marking score





University-wide criteria

Academic score calculation

The weighted average of your year 1 marks, which are ratified and published in EUCLID as of Monday 27 November 2023, will be taken into consideration to make up your academic score.

Only numerical marks will be used to calculate your average - if you have pass/fail marks, these will not be included in the calculation.

Weighted averages will be based on your first attempt at the course (unless you have been granted a null sit due to special circumstances).



University-wide criteria

Personal statement assessment	Academic motivation	Focusing on the first choice of institution, it should explain the academic motivations for applying to go on a University-wide exchange
	Ambassadorial qualities	Highlight the qualities you have to be a good representative of the University of Edinburgh, with examples from extracurricular activities
	Personal development	Explains how this opportunity would benefit you from a personal perspective



University-wide allocations

Applications close at 12:00pm (noon) on Wednesday 15 November

Successfully scored students entered in the 'Applicant pool'

Students allocated places in order of application ranking

Accept or decline your offers by 12:00pm (noon) Thursday 18 January For our European, university-wide, partner institutions, preference is given to students from schools which:

- Have no or limited European options under the subject-specific route
- Have no or limited European options with partners who teach in English

University-wide applications are **competitive**.



University-wide allocation scenarios

If you're allocated one of your five preferred institutions

You cannot decline the offer without forfeiting your exchange place

If none of your five preferred institutions are available

- You may be offered alternatives within one of the regions you chose
- You have the option to reject the alternative twice
- If you reject three times you will forfeit your exchange place

If you receive more than one offer

- You can only accept one offer
- If you accept both a university-wide and subject-specific offer, both will be cancelled



Subject-specific allocations

Applications close at 12:00pm (noon) on Wednesday 15 November

Exchange Coordinators assess applications for their subject area

Offers will be made by **12:00pm (noon) Thursday 11 January**

Accept or decline your offers by **12:00pm** (noon) on Thursday 18 January

Schools to reallocate vacant spaces February Selection criteria can vary between Schools but is generally based on:

- Your academic record (normally only your 1st year grades)
- Your personal statement
- Your linguistic suitability



University of California (UC)

- 45 international exchange places available
- UC allocate the campus
 - We can't guarantee, influence or change the decision; you need to be prepared to accept any campus <u>www.reciprocity.uceap.universityofcalifornia.edu/</u>
- Early acceptance deadline 12:00pm (noon) Thursday 4th January
 - If allocated, you may have to decide before subject-specific offers are made





Criteria to fulfil

To proceed with your exchange, you must have:

- Appropriate courses available at your host institution
- Approval from you School Exchange Coordinator(s)
- For 2024/25 applications, your credits might have been impacted by industrial action. Please contact your School if you have concerns about meeting the outlined academic requirements. More information has been provided about University-Wide criteria in the relevant Application Guide.


