

What do you enjoy in the programme?

AC: I am pleased to see a range of responses here which include course-related positivity, as well as a recognition that the IFP is supporting friendships, class discussion and belonging. We work hard to ensure that the Programme has an inclusive learning environment for all so I was particularly pleased to see that as one of the aspects being enjoyed by the students.

Why do you enjoy it?

- I love to see many topics I once thought to be silly ideas of mine being studied, and having the opportunity
 to intellectually discuss them in psychology and social science classes. But my favorite part of the program
 is being able to interact with people from all different backgrounds, who are in the same boat as me at the
 end of the day.
- I feel in a learning environment that encourages me to explore my academic abilities and learn from great teachers.
- What I want to improve the most is my spoken English so I appreciate when in lessons we do speaking activities.
- I can improve my English Learning skills.
- Because the course atmosphere is relaxing.
- Mainly because the course content intrigues me a lot.
- The learning method and also the material we discuss in class is so interesting.
- I can learn a lot from the teachers.
- Almost all classes are insightful and interesting. I especially like philosophy and social sciences. Every topic
 philosophy covers is interesting, and the group activities we do in social sciences tutorials are fun and
 insightful.
- I like the fact that we have a small number of students in a class and it is easier to interact with each other and with the teacher.

AC: Again, great to see positive comments here about the small class size and opportunities for discussion and inter-cultural communication.

What do you think can be improved about the programme?

6 people think the programme is perfect as is.

Schedule and time management (lunch break):

- The schedule could be improved, Long breaks are annoying cause you get stuck around campus for a long period of time with nothing to do.
- I would like to suggest that maybe we can adjust the time on schedule, because sometimes we don't have time for lunch. / I do hope the 30-minute break time at noon can be extended because sometimes it is not enough for me to have my lunch. / I often struggle to have time to eat enough lunch because of my class schedule
- Teachers should be stricter about the finishing time since some classes go a lot longer than it's supposed to be.

AC: I recognise that the time given for lunch can be short. In timetabling, we are trying to balance staff availability, room availability but also ensuring that students finish earlier in the day to mitigate anxiety from previous students about walking home in the dark at the end of Term 1. Students should check the PDF timetable on our Programme LEARN site for class times as it may differ from their Outlook timetable.

Course content

• The FEAP classes could be more challenging or just taken out and replaced by another subject for students with an IELTS grade above a certain level.

AC: In the revised IFP (starting 2025/26), Plus students will learn a language instead of taking FEAP for two teaching blocks. AK was interested in this as an idea as she is already learning German. However, there were some questions about the languages being offered.

- I think FEAP class should be 3 courses for those with high IELTS scores/academic essay writing experiences: entry, plus, advanced.
- More art classes.
- I think we should have more subjects that are related to the thing we major, not just learning things that we probably will never use in my whole life.

AC: The IFP is about learning skills that students can apply to their UG programmes, not about teaching content that will be repeated in Yr 1 of a UG programme. IFP students should think less about content and more about how they can use the skills they're learning to apply to their future learning.

• I believe that there could be more focus on the progression into our undergraduate studies rather than spending so much class time revising so many basic writing elements.

AC: I am hoping that students are now seeing this in the UCAS teaching in LLiB in Weeks 6, 8 and 9.

• I think there should be more classes connected to business/economics.

AC: See my comment above.

• I feel like LLiB should've been explained more clearly because I don't really understand what's the point of it plus, I don't know what to expect each week as it is usually a different topic + teacher so I don't really get a chance to practice the previous weeks' topics.

AC: The workbook is for practising what you have learned in LLiB and all teachers are very happy to answer questions. I also offered a drop-in session for students with questions in Week 6.

Course style

- If the psychology class offered a summary reading material for helping us review.
- It's almost perfect! But I hope the tutorial classes could be more detailed.
- The organization and the structure of topics in social sciences class, especially in the tutorial classes is done poorly.
- The social science professors aren't organized with each other, and it makes it difficult to link the lecture with the tutorial.
- Make the lessons longer.
- I think in social sciences lectures there are too many people and that makes it hard to engage.

AC: I have asked the Course Organiser and Head of Subject Area to look into the questions about the Social Science course.

Lessons could go slower.

AC: Students should always feel free to put their hands up if the teacher is moving too quickly or to ask questions in person or by email to make sure they get what they need for their classes.

Other

Many undergraduate students don't know about the foundation programme, and i often have to explain
what it is, why i have to go through the foundation programme, etc, and it makes me feel isolated from the
whole university community. I hope there will be opportunities for undergraduate students to learn about
our course and its necessity.

AC: Our Head of Transitions, Liz MacDougall is doing work in this area and the more that our students get involved in the wider university community through sports, clubs and societies, the better-informed other student communities will be!

• It'd be nice if the course could provide more opportunities for students to learn about each other's culture.

AC: I hope all IFP students are taking the opportunities within their courses to share discussion about their cultures and food. LLiB reflections are a great place to do this, particularly through the peer feedback comments on reflective pieces and the mini presentation task.

Any other business

IFP social events

AC: We are planning a number of trips in the next few months, but I asked Asumi about whether she felt there would be interest in a social event. We agreed that an 'opt-in' event would be best. There is the end of Term 1 party in the final teaching week of term for students to spend time together before the Winter break.
