### Recent study requirements

To demonstrate that students are prepared for degree-level study, we expect the qualifications used to meet our entry requirements to have been achieved within the previous three academic years before the date of entry. ### Contextual factors and widening access offers

We recognise that applicants will have differing backgrounds and experience and that they will not all have had the same opportunities to demonstrate their potential. Consequently, in identifying those with the greatest capacity to benefit from the distinctive education that this University has to offer, we seek to set academic achievement in context through the consideration of a range of contextual factors. There are two types of flags that we can assign an application, 'Plus flag' and 'Flag'. Full details on what each flag means for your application can also be found by following the link above.

### Academic entry requirements

To be considered for an offer of a place, all applicants must meet the following requirements:

#### SQA Highers

ABBB by the end of S5 or ABBBB/ AABB from S4-S6.

Applicants with a Plus flag: ABBB by the end of S6.

In at least one year of the senior phase (S4-S6), applicants must achieve, or be predicted to achieve, three or more Highers at grade B or better (Advanced Highers at grade C or better).

### Selection procedures for our programmes

The College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences offers almost 300 different degree programmes.

As we have many more applicants than places available this means that for most programmes, achieving the academic entry requirements alone will not result in an offer of a place and a more detailed selection process is required.

Our selection process involves a detailed analysis of all of the information on your UCAS application.

Following assessment of the academic profile, our Admissions Officers look for:

- a well-constructed and articulate personal statement that demonstrates a clear motivation for your chosen area of study;
- demonstration of extracurricular activities;
- a supportive academic reference.

It is important to note that the selection process is not automated. The process involves a careful assessment of all relevant factors and is balanced against the overall standard of the entire cohort of qualified and suitable applicants.



### Predicted grades

We use predicted grades as part of our selection procedures.

It is therefore very important that your application includes predicted grades for any qualifications that you have listed on your application but have not yet completed. It is your responsibility to ensure that your referee adds these predicted grades to your application when adding your reference.

For some qualifications please note that we require both an overall predicted grade and also a prediction for each of the subjects you are taking.

### Timescales for decision-making

We give all completed applications submitted by the 26 January deadline full and equal consideration and generally complete the selection process by late March. If you apply early in the application cycle it may therefore take some time for you to receive the final decision on your application.

Please note that we do not normally consider applications from UK students submitted after the 26 January deadline.

### Applications to more than one degree programme in the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences

You can apply for as many or as few programmes as you wish, within the limitations of the five choices available on the UCAS application. However, it is likely that only one offer will be made to students who apply to more than one programme within the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences.

If you are planning to submit more than one application, you are advised to contact the Undergraduate Admissions Office to advise them of your preference(s).

### Applications for deferred entry

We support applicants who plan to take a gap year as a means of gaining valuable experience, either through work or travel, prior to commencing their studies. However, for most programmes we are only able to make a limited number of offers to deferred applicants and so it may be advisable for you to apply during your gap year rather than for deferred entry. Please contact the Undergraduate Admissions Office directly for further advice.
