Their work stimulates social change through the promotion of collaboration around themes such as diversity, coexistence, conflict and peace. IAD Workshop: Get that Paper Written and

Published

This two-day workshop helps researchers learn the skills of writing research papers for peer reviewed journals. It focuses on all the steps involved in the writing process after the collection and analysis of data: clarifying the message of our paper; mapping out the manuscript to get the ideas into a logical structure; writing the first draft; editing the manuscript; submitting the manuscript; and successfully navigating the reviewing process to final publication.

During the workshop, through written exercises and discussions, delegates will examine all aspects of the process, and start drafting their own research manuscripts.

This workshop is suitable for:

- Early career (postdoc) researchers with little or no experience of writing papers for peer-reviewed journals;

Other funding opportunities

ESRC New Investigator Grant Deadline: 29 April 2022

This internal selection process for the ESRC New Investigator grant may be of interest to early career colleagues during their Annual Review process.

The grant supports researchers at the start of their careers to become independent researchers through gaining experience of managing and leading research projects and teams. However, unlike some other early career schemes, ESRC has removed the time-bound eligibility criteria based on years since PhD award, 'in recognition of the increasing diversity in career trajectories'.

It remains a highly competitive scheme, and the University of Edinburgh therefore has a rigorous internal demand management process to decide whether candidates can submit to the funder. This process is a significant investment of time from the candidates (who should also have at least two peer-reviewed academic publications which are deemed of high quality), and from their mentors (who should be senior colleagues within MHSES, and not usually the candidate's PhD supervisor).

To help support and select potential candidates, MHSES is introducing a School-level selection process. We are asking for an initial outline proposal, short CV and confirmed mentor by 16

Daniella Sciama Award for Achievement through Adversity

Deadline: 29 April 2022

Honouring University of Edinburgh student, Daniella Sciama, who died in December 2013 following a sudden asthma attack, this award will be made to a current student of the University of Edinburgh who has made significant achievements in the face of adversity. Horizon Europe guarantee extended Deadline: 31 December 2022

UK government announced that it will extend the Horizon Europe guarantee to include awards expected to be signed by 31 December 2022. The government also reiterated its commitment to association with Horizon Europe; at the same time it is also discussing the Plan B options that would take the place of HE, should the UK be unable to associate. The guarantee will now be in place for awards expected to be signed by 31 December 2022 and for which the last legal date for signing grant agreements is expected to pass before 31 December 2022. The funding will continue to be delivered through UKRI and will cover the first two waves of grant awards. The guidance available on the UKRI website provides further info on the guarantee.
