In a crumbling military base in the far north of Russia, a community of women patiently await the return of their husbands, serving aboard a submarine. Although bound together in this life of uncertainty and expectation, the women of this community lead very different lives, with the film's central character, Lena, living at an icy remove from the other wives. As Lena's own story of doubt and infidelity unfolds, so too do whispers of disaster begin to reach the surface.

Yusup Razykov

A veteran writer and director of film and television, Razykov can count work as an electrician at Uzbekfilm as one of his less well known accomplishments. Razykov is a versatile director, and many of his



works, such as Shame, Migrant Worker and The Dance of Men stand in direct relation to the problems of contemporary society. He has directed and written numerous films in his native Uzbek, as well as Russian.

Veledinsky's twistedly funny *The Geographer Drank His Globe Away* follows hapless biologist, Viktor Sluzhkin, as he tries his luck as a geography teacher in a provincial school. Armed with a best friend, an unhappy marriage and copious amounts of alcohol, Viktor struggles on in the face of an unruly class and maps that refuse to be read. And as if that wasn't enough, Viktor suddenly discovers love in the most unexpected of places...

Aleksandr Veledinsky Born in Gorky (now Nizhny Novgorod) in 1959, Aleksandr Veledinsky is an accomplished director and screenwriter. He

made his feature film debut with Russian (Russkoe, 2004) and has since gone on to receive numerous accolades at festivals around the world. The Geographer Drank his Globe Away is his third feature film.

Pipeline, the latest documentary from acclaimed director Vitaly Mansky, follows the course of the Trans-Siberian gas pipeline through Russia and into Europe. As the camera travels the length of the pipeline, the viewer is given access to the lives and landscapes of which the pipeline is a central part. While the pipeline may be a prominent symbol of Russia's

resurgence, the lives captured in Pipeline show that for many, little has changed.

Vitaly Mansky is known as Russia's master of documentary films. His works have been presented at more than 400



international film festivals. Vitaly Mansky is the publisher of the oldest web-magazine on documentary films "VERTOV.RU", and the author of the Reality Cinema Manifesto. He also founded the Artdocfest festival for independent films.
